The Old Farmer's Almanac is predicting another teeth-chatteringly cold winter across the United States! "Colder is just almost too familiar a term," Editor Janice Stillman said. "Think of it as a refriger-nation." The Almanac predicted that this winter will be another arctic blast with above-normal snowfall throughout much of the nation.

Who is responsible for clearing snow-filled streets?

Watterson Park is responsible for clearing residential streets; privately-owned streets are the responsibility of the owner(s). To this end, we have contracted with Countywide Lawn & Landscaping to plow and/or salt City streets when the need arises. Our goal in doing so is to maintain safe travel routes for emergency response vehicles as well as for the general public. Residents can be assured that when significant snowfall accumulates, Watterson Park will make every effort to plow our streets in a timely manner. If snow accumulation is minimal and plowing is not necessary, salt and/or sand may be applied.

How can I help?

YOU CAN HELP BY KEEPING YOUR CARS OFF THE STREETS WHEN SNOW AND/OR ICE IS FORECAST. Parked cars are an obstacle to properly clearing the streets and also pose a hazard that plows, as well as other vehicles, must maneuver around. Your street will be plowed more thoroughly if there are fewer cars parked on it.

Who clears sidewalks and driveways?

Clearing the sidewalks and driveways is the responsibility of residents and property owners. Please shovel the snow into your yard, not onto the street. Shoveling snow onto the street and sidewalk can cause hazardous conditions for both cars and pedestrians. And if you wait until after your street has been plowed to clear your driveway, you can avoid double shoveling. NOTE: When plowing our streets, some snow may be deposited in your driveway and yard; this is unavoidable. Rest assured that the plow drivers try to keep the amount of snow pushed onto your property to a minimum.

Yard Waste Bag Ban

Beginning January 1, 2015, environmentally friendly, biodegradable/compostable bags will be the only types of bags permitted for the collection and disposal of yard waste materials in Metro Louisville. Residents may still use self-enclosed containers, carts, and cans as well as tied-and-bundled, easy-to-handle twigs and branches. Industrial Disposal will not pick up yard waste that is in a non-conforming bag.

Pursuant to this Metro Louisville ban, Watterson Park is investigating supplying residents with wheeled yard-waste carts. We will keep you updated.


New Website Feature...
